The featured artists are Sheilagh McCafferty, Brian Johnson, Heather Lee and Deirdre Spillane-Jimenez. There may be surprises from a couple of other young designers too.



Sheilegh McCafferty is a local couturier who founded *Sacramento Costumers*, a collective where individuals



Brian Johnson arrived in Sacramento from Gary Indiana. He enjoys creating vintage streetwear with a gritty and grow their own fashion brands and also work together to complete larger projects. She created a credited work experience with Los Rios Community College District that provides Fashion and Theater students an intern experience in costuming with the Sacramento Philharmonic Opera's spring production. Sheilegh will be showing us her collection of modern but retro jackets and coats. Her clothing line is called Uppity Epicycle Couture.

Heather Lee, who grew up in the U.K. but now resides in Sacramento, is a 2023 graduate of UC Davis Design Program. She creates one-off clothing designs for costuming, many inspired by fantasy, nature and pagan themes. She will be sharing some steampunk designs with us.



Deirdre Spillane-Jimenez is a fashion designer and pattern maker who creates casual wear greatly inspired by the natural world. Her *Natewa* collection was inspired by the coral reefs of Fiji where the underwater movement and graceful natural forms of the reefs inspired her during a conservation research expedition. Deirdre is a recent

graduate of the UC Davis Design Program.

Artist Statement: "Over the years I've used several different mediums in my artwork, from fabrics, glass, to pastels and now paper. I currently work at University Art and was put in charge of ordering the paper. Once that happened my paper fetish blossomed! The papers are from around the world and are made one sheet at a time using natural fibers and inclusions to form the finished product. Harvested bananas and mango trees are ground up and used as filler in the papermaking process. Kozo fibers, mulberry


bark, and sometimes cotton fibers are also used in the process. The biggest challenge was finding a way to show all of the different textures, colors and varieties in the paper to his fullest. I finally realized that light was the answer. The lamp design was to be as simple as possible to go with all styles of décor. My grandson welds them for me until he can teach me how. With production comes scraps and I've used all the scraps to make the beautifully fluid mobiles and colorful and useful night lights. I love being able to provide ambient light and color to a homey space."
